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Introduction

A frequent question asked by people is what is the role of the Parish Pastoral Council and how does it function. This resource book attempts to provide answers to these questions.

The book provides clarity on the role of the PPC, which will enable the PPCs in the diocese to function more effectively. It also offers suggestions on how to run an effective meeting, as well as suggesting relevant discussion topics for the agenda. Prayer resources are offered for use at the meeting.



How to use the book:

- At the first meeting of the year, it is recommended that time is spent reflecting on The Role
 of the Parish Pastoral Council [pg 4] so that there is a shared understanding among all of
 the role of this group.
- When planning the meeting, use the template outlined on page 6
- Once a year, take time to review the effectiveness of your meeting by using the template on page 35.
- Choose one of the discussion topics [pgs 8-18] as an item for inclusion on the agenda for each meeting.
- Prayer and reflection is central to the work of the PPC before you lead the prayer, take time to read pages 20-21.
- Choose one of the prayer resources [pgs 22-32] for each meeting.





The Role of the Parish Pastoral Council

What is the Mission of the Parish?

The parish is a community of people, who are inspired by Jesus Christ and committed to proclaiming God's dream for our world. By word and action, the parish seeks to spread the Gospel of the risen Christ, and to be the Body of Christ on earth.

Who is responsible for promoting the mission of the parish?

It is the task of all the baptised to promote Jesus' work of love, peace, justice and freedom. The priest does not have sole responsibility for building up the church community. The carrying out of the mission of Jesus Christ is the responsibility of both the laity and the priest(s) working together in partnership.

What is the Parish Pastoral Council?

The Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) is a leadership group through which priests and people work together as co-responsible partners in furthering the mission of Christ in their parish.

What is the role of the PPC?

The Parish Pastoral Council has an:

- Advisory role Advises the priest(s) in relation to pastoral needs and issues.
- Coordinating role Supports and promotes the work of the various parish groups and ministries.
- Planning role Plans for the parish on an ongoing basis, responding to present and future needs.



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Prayer

Prayer is central to the work and life of the PPC as its source of inspiration and vision.

Consultative

The PPC is a consultative body. The parish priest/moderator explores pastoral needs and concerns with the members. The task of the members is to represent the wisdom of the parish faith community. By respectful sharing and listening, the PPC comes to decisions.

Role and responsibility of members

Members of the Parish Pastoral Council have a responsibility to:

- · Listen to the needs of parishioners
- Participate in discussion but not force personal opinions
- · Listen to the views of others in a non-judgemental manner
- Submit agenda items on an agreed date before meeting
- Read materials circulated
- · Carry out actions agreed at meeting
- Notify secretary in advance if unable to attend a meeting.

An effective Parish Pastoral Council makes a real difference. It enables all the members of the parish faith community to participate fully in the life of the parish by sharing their talents, wisdom and faith, thus helping to build a welcoming and compassionate parish faith community.



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Careful planning before, during and after the meeting is required to ensure that time is used well and is productive.

Elements that contribute to working well together at meetings include:

Before the Meeting

- The chairperson, secretary and priest meet to prepare the agenda.
- The secretary notifies members of the upcoming meeting and circulates the agenda.

During the Meeting

Welcoming environment

• Ensure that the venue is comfortable and organise seating in a way that is conducive to the active participation of all members.

Prayer

• Develop prayer as part of the life of the group and as its source of inspiration.

Agenda


- An agenda is simply a list of things you want to discuss at the meeting.
- Prioritise items so that those needing attention can be dealt with first.

Timeframe

• Begin and end each meeting according to the time schedule agreed by the group.

Social Dimension

• The chat and the cup of tea after the meeting provide a non-threatening and enjoyable way of building social interaction.



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After the Meeting

- Minutes should be circulated shortly after the meeting to allow members act on agreed matters.
 - Minutes are a record of the issues addressed and the agreed outcomes. They are a record of the proposed actions and the person(s) responsible for carrying them out.
- Follow up on agreed actions
 - The overall effectiveness of a pastoral council depends on the participation of its members. Agreed actions need to be carried out and reported on at the next meeting.

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Discussion 1 Plé 1

Season of Creation in our parish

Step 1: Examine the present reality in our parish

- 1. Is there an awareness of the Season of Creation in our parish?
- 2. How did we encourage people to reduce food waste in 2017?
- 3. In what ways do we care for God's creation in our parish?

Step 2: Take time to reflect

Catholic Social Teaching [CST] is a rich treasure of wisdom about building a just society and acting responsibly amidst the challenges of modern society. One of the themes of CST is 'Care for God's Creation'. Our faith reminds us that we are partners in caring for creation and so we, as Catholics, are called to live out this faith in relationship with all of God's creation. The Season of Creation from September 1st – October 4th offers opportunities to deepen our faith in action. This year's theme focuses on our being part of the solution to plastic pollution.

In 'Laudato Si', On Care for our Common Home, Pope Francis says that 'our Sister, Mother Earth...cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her.'This is why the Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation (JPIC) committee of the Diocese of Kerry has chosen 'Plastic Pollution' as our theme for the Season of Creation 2018.

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Step 3: Explore various options

Having looked at the present awareness of the Season of Creation in our parish and taken time to reflect on the Diocesan Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation's statement, discuss ways of protecting 'Our Common Home' from irreparable harm.

- Following the discussion and reflection, identify actions in which our parish can reduce the amount of plastic it uses. How might the parish act together to prevent plastic pollution?
- If no action has been agreed, identify what further research is required?

Step 5: When the action is completed, take time to review it

- a. Did the action achieve its purpose?
- b. What worked well?
- c. Is there a follow-up action needed?





Discussion 2 Plé 2

Our parish presence on the internet

Step 1: Examine the present reality in our parish

- 1. Name the ways the parish is presently using technology for communication.
- 2. Who is responsible for managing the parish page on the diocesan website? The parish website? or Facebook?
- 3. How do we assess the effectiveness of our use of technology?

Step 2: Take time to reflect

Whether or not your parish has a newsletter or parish magazine, a parish website is almost essential today if the parish is to reach out to people on the margins, who may not be in regular contact with the church. Some use websites to find Mass times or other basic parish information; but when an attractive website is encountered, it can be a tool for greater communication and evangelisation.

Parishioners appreciate websites that give them all sorts of parish information. Ministry rosters can be displayed so that people can check when they are next to read at mass or when they are to act as extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion. A website also allows a parish extra space to describe in full what is involved in baptism in the parish or a marriage or funeral. More than anything, your website needs to convey what is wonderful about your parish.

Parish communications cannot be confined to newsletters, magazine and websites, however. Some parishes invest in technology that allows them to broadcast their masses in the local area and even globally using the World Wide Web) – a godsend to elderly and housebound people. In a rapidlychanging age of communication, no parish can afford to be left behind in employing every media to spread the Good News.

Discussion 3 Plé 3

Review parish groups and ministries

Step 1: Examine the present reality in our parish

- 1. Name the ministries and church groups presently in the parish.
- 2. What is the relationship between the PPC and these groups and ministries?
- 3. How do we recognise the contribution of these groups and ministries to the life of our parish?

Step 2: Take time to reflect

The Parish Pastoral Council is not just another ministry group; the PPC is the parish leadership group, through which priest(s) and people work together as co-responsible partners in furthering the mission of Christ in their parish.

As well as providing leadership and acting in an advisory role to the priest/ moderator, it has a role in coordinating the various pastoral initiatives within the parish. It is responsible for overseeing that the necessary groups and ministries exist in order to enable parishioners to contribute to the wellbeing of the parish. However, it may not infringe upon the autonomy of ministerial groups; its role is to support them.

Ministry Groups include:

Finance Council works with the parish priest in the administration of the goods of the parish.

Liturgy Group works with the priests to develop the life of prayer and worship in the community.

Safeguarding Children Committee works with the priest(s) to promote the safeguarding of children within church organisations and activities, and to oversee the implementation of diocesan policies and procedures.



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Other ministries include Ministers of the Word, Ministers of the Eucharist, Choir, Altar Servers, Altar Society, Collectors, Adoration Group, Funeral Lay Ministry and Baptism Team.

Apostolic groups include St. Joseph's Young Priests' Society, Legion of Mary, St Vincent de Paul and Pioneers.

Step 3: Explore various options

Having reflected on the various ministries in the parish and how the PPC relates with them, explore what other ministries are needed. Also look at how the PPC encourages and supports the different ministry groups e.g. arranging training or celebration night or recruitment of new members.

Step 4: Identify specific actions

- Informed by the discussion and reflection, agree what needs to be done to support the existing ministers in the various groups and ministries. Identify what new ministries would support the parish's emerging needs.
- If no action has been agreed, identify what further research is needed.

Step 5: When the action is completed, take time to review it

- a. Did the action achieve its purpose?
- b. What worked well?
- c. Is there a follow-up action needed?





How can parish support young people?

Step 1: Examine the present reality in our parish

- 1. In what ways does the parish support young people?
- 2. Is our parish a welcoming place for young people?
- 3. How does the parish reach out to all young people?

Step 2: Take time to reflect

Ideally, parishes are places where young people are welcomed, grow in Jesus Christ and minister side by side with the adults of the community. Here young people need to have a wide variety of opportunities to use their gifts and to express their faith through meaningful roles. If parishes are to be worthy of the loyalty and participation of young people, they need to become youth-friendly communities. A decision to do so often impacts upon other aspects of parish life e.g. such things as the style and length of preaching, the use of creativity, membership of parish groups and committees etc.

In youth-friendly Irish parishes young people feel this sense of acceptance and as a result they bring youthfulness, energy, hope and vision to their parish community. They also develop a spirit of commitment to their community by becoming involved in the many ways the Church carries out its mission. When this happens it's a great enrichment to the whole parish.

In order to become more youth-friendly a parish will usually have to look to adult lay people to take a leading role, working in partnership with parish clergy and religious. This commitment to youth ministry in the parish setting is vital to the life of the local Church.

Discussion 5 Plé 5

Supporting Family Life

Step 1: Examine the present reality in our parish

- 1. Name the ways we are connecting with families
- 2. What support and encouragement do we offer families?
- 3. How do we celebrate family as the domestic church?

Step 2: Take time to reflect

We do not often think of our families as holy....but real holiness is about wholeness. It is about being real people living real lives...even in the middle of noise and busyness, chaos and kinds, dinners to be cooked and floors o be washed, there is something very special that speaks to us about God. That is what the holiness of family life is about, the love at the heart of family expressed in the day-to-day realities of living.

Family is good news and, lived in faith, family becomes a way to share that faith and good news with others. There is a prayer said to have been written by St. Teresa of Avila: "Christ has no body now but yours, no hands or feet on earth but yours." This is what we are invited to be – Christ for each other and the world.

We know family life can be messy and complicated but where love is, God is.

- Following the discussion and reflection, identify actions that we could carry out to acknowledge and celebrate the gift of family life.
- If no action has been agreed, identify what further research is needed.

Step 5: When the action is completed take time to review it by exploring:

- a. Did the action achieve its purpose?
- b. What worked well?
- c. Is there a follow-up action needed?





Discussion 6 Plé 6

Praying with the Gospels

Step 1: Examine the present reality in our parish

- 1. Name the different opportunities for prayer in the parish
- 2. How does our parish support adults to develop their life of prayer?

Step 2: Take time to reflect

Only if we know, recognize, adore and follow Jesus will he truly be "the centre of our life". And to do this there are a few gestures available to everyone: to always have close at hand a pocket version of the Gospel so as to easily read it each day, along with the recitation of brief prayers of adoration, such as the Gloria, while paying close attention not to simply "parrot" the words. The point is: "to recognize Jesus, to know Jesus". And although it is good to know about "the life of this or that saint" or about "the apparitions of that one here and there", one must never lose sight of the fact that "the centre is Jesus Christ: without Jesus Christ there are no saints".

Indeed, to "know Jesus, one must first "be able to recognize him". "To know Jesus, there is prayer, the Holy Spirit, yes, but it is also good practice to "pick up the Gospel every day". "How many of you pick up the Gospel each day and read a passage? It is important to always take a copy of the Gospel with you, such as "the pocket version, which is small, in order to be carried in a pocket, purse", so it is "always with me". And in this way, keeping it always close at hand, we can "read a passage of the Gospel every day: it is the only way to know Jesus", to know "what he did, what he said". "Please, do this: each day a passage of the Gospel, a small one — three, four, five minutes". It is precisely by reading it that the Gospel is understood, "and this works within: it is the Holy Spirit who then does his work. This is the seed. It is the Holy Spirit who makes the seed sprout and grow".

Step 3: Explore various options

Having looked at the opportunities for adults to develop their prayer life and taken time to reflect on Pope Francis' invitation to know Jesus through the Gospels, explore various possibilities of how our parish could support adults in developing their relationship with Jesus Christ.

Step 4: Identify specific actions

- Informed by the discussion and reflection, identify specific actions that we could carry out in order to offer people an experience of Gospel prayer or how to read the Gospels.
- If no action has been agreed, identify what further research is needed.

Step 5: When the action is completed, take time to review it

- a. Did the action achieve its purpose?
- b. What was not effective?
- c. Is there a follow-up action needed?





These prayer resources offer prayers to be said in common, scripture passages or reflections to be listened to and some moments of quiet and reflection. As a group, take your time to pray with them. It is an opportunity to stand back from the tasks of our group, and to reflect awhile...to wonder and to be rooted again in God's vision for the world.

Before you start to lead the prayer:

Preparation

The time you put into being prepared and organised for leading the prayer moment, will make it easier for you, and more enriching for all of us. Write on your page. Highlight what you are saying and what others are saying. Arrive in time to allow yourself plenty of time to be organised, so that when you come to lead the prayer, they have become your prayers.

Involve others

Know how many readers you will need and give them the chance to read through their piece prior to the time of prayer. Not everyone is comfortable to read...so let people choose whether or not they wish to take part. Invite the group to put aside their folders/books and pens. Leave time and space so that people are not rushed. Trust the Holy Spirit!

Sacred Space

Creating a simple focal point for your prayer time allows us to centre and focus. Place a candle, image or symbol on a cloth for the prayer time. It may also help us during the meeting to remind us of God in our midst.





During the prayer:

Take time to pause and be silent

During these times of prayer, use silence and pauses to enable us to listen and hear what has been said, to allow the words to find an echo in our hearts and to let us be touched by God.

Notice your pace

Life can be very busy. Take your time with these prayer times, so that we can all slow down a little! When we are leading something, it can sometimes be hard to get a sense of our speed and pace. A good rule of thumb is to count...after a reading or a reflection, count to 30 slowly...if you have invited the group to think about a question for their own life, count to 40 slowly...gradually we will all become comfortable with the pace of the prayer.

Practise

For most of us, leading others into prayer is a new experience. And like all new things, it takes time to get used to. So let's practise, it will ease the way for all of us!

Finally, always remember,

"Where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there in your midst"


