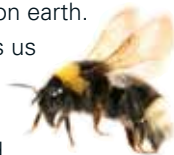

### AN GLAOCH: we are called to:

- **join** the river of justice and peace
- **act for** climate and ecological justice
- **speak out** with and for the most impacted communities

### NEWS FLASH: Irish Bishops' Spring Statement, 8 March 2023

'In response to the impending loss of nature to our world, the call of Pope Francis' 2015 encyclical letter, *Laudato Si'*, and agreements made at the recent UN Conference on Biodiversity (COP15), bishops ask parishes, through their parish pastoral councils and diocesan trusts, as a first step, to identify and care for 30 per cent of parish grounds as a haven for pollinators and biodiversity, so that it can be enjoyed in perpetuity by the whole community.'

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## So what can we do in our parishes, schools and homes?

Spend time in nature, *sa nadúr*, listening, looking, feeling; come to know and appreciate God’s Book of Nature.

(‘A Prayer for our Earth’, *Laudato Si’, 246*)

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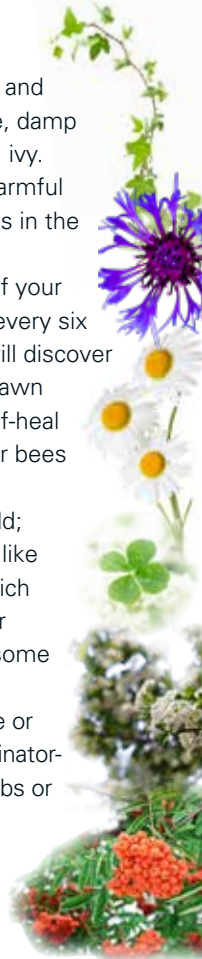
Encourage the parish, and **offer** to be part of a ‘care of creation’ group; then with parish approval, a part of the garden/parish can become a haven for pollinators and biodiversity.



- Walk the grounds with your group, and draw a simple map of it.



- **Take note** of existing plants and habitats; for example, hedge, damp area, shrubs, bushes, a wall, ivy.
- Agree to **avoid** the use of harmful chemical sprays or pesticides in the whole area.
- In year one, **change** some of your mowing regime; mow only every six weeks. By doing this, you will discover existing wild flowers in the lawn area, like daisies, nóiníni, self-heal and clover, providing food for bees and other insects.
- **Consider** what you could add; for example, native hedging like hawthorn, sceach gheal, which provides food and shelter for birds and insects, a bench, some herbs, a native tree.
- Are your grounds all concrete or tarmacadam? Add some pollinator-friendly pots of heathers, herbs or even a raised bed.
- **Pray** outside. If setting up a new biodiversity area, bless it during the Season of Creation.
- **Add** some *Laudato Si’* quotes to your parish bulletin and to parish grounds.
- **Include** a general intercession every Sunday during the Season of Creation.
