A NOTE FROM FR JIM.....

I read an article one time on the brilliant English rugby out half Jonny Wilkinson. It highlighted the fact that while he played for Newcastle Falcons he used to show up 90 minutes before everybody else and spend that time practising his kicking. And after the team session he would stay on for a further hour. All top professionals in sport become as good as they are simply by practice. They develop what's called muscle memory. So when that one moment came where Jonny Wilkinson kicked the winning score to claim the 2003 Rugby World Cup, it was muscle memory that he called on, those hours of dedication paid off. As human beings we tend to forget easily. We see amazing scenery and say wow but after a while it fades from our thoughts. We enjoy a beautiful meal and later when we're hungry we don't even recall it. When teaching children anything, once is never enough. They need to hear it over and over again or else they'll eventually forget it. In our first reading this weekend from the Book of Deuteronomy Moses noticed how quickly the people of Israel forgot all the miracles and wonders that God had worked for them. Moses pleaded with the Israelites and the generations to follow them to never forget God's love and power in their lives which will define them as a people of God. Jesus told his disciples at the last supper to do this in memory of me. The only way his memory would be kept alive was to recall often the sacrifice he made on the Cross which was celebrated liturgically at the last supper. Only by practicing our faith every week, worshiping him by recalling his great sacrifice can we hope to make our Christian faith second nature. When Billy Graham was asked why did he have to pray all the time he said 'I leak'. And so do we. For about 80% of Catholic's who don't attend mass on a weekly basis they run the risk of forgetting the Christian story, moreover in an anti religious society like ours. We must all accept that our memories are not as good as we think. To keep the memory of Jesus Christ alive we must practice our faith over and over again until His ways become second nature to us.
