#### A NOTE FROM FR. JIM....

As a priest now for many years I have always been in awe of how brilliant people can be at their work or other pursuits of interest. I'm amazed how tuned in and astute so many people are dealing with their affairs with such passion and detail. I can remember listening to business people over the years discussing financial matters and when to buy or sell on the stock exchange. In horse racing I can remember listening to my friends who were racing enthusiast in Listowel reading the form of different horses. It was amazing to see how much they knew about each horse and what weight they were carrying, where they finished in their last five outings and how much the jackpot would be if their horses won in consecutive races. And when it comes to football some not just know every tactical set up and different match ups for Sunday's game they could also give you a blow to blow account of a match that happened this time last year. In all of the above cases I'm blown away by people's intelligence, dedication and enthusiasm for these interests. But where I have a worry is what about their interest in heavenly and spiritual matters. How much thought goes into saving their eternal soul. Please don't get me wrong, I am not knocking what they do, in fact I deeply admire their God given gifts and talents. But for me I do believe the problem arises when it comes to things of God that they can be at times clueless and totally unprepared for that moment they will meet their maker and be judged on the law of love, in other words how they have loved God and others. If it is true that God does exist and there is a life here after and how we behave in this life has eternal consequences, well it is fair to conclude that nothing else really matters. Scripture teaches us to set our hearts on heavenly things, to store up treasures for ourselves in heaven. In today's Gospel Jesus uses the word fool. The fool in scripture is the one who lives and plans life without God. The greedy farmer in today's Gospel had no idea how idiotic his plans were in the

context of eternity. It's important to work hard in this life and to become the best we can be in all we do. But always remember that life is fragile and fleeting, and the things we work for today can disappear in an instant. The Gospel challenges us to ask: "What truly matters?" Are you spiritually wise or foolish?
