Traditionally, this Sunday is called Gaudete Sunday, which means 'a day for rejoicing'. Advent is about half over, and the day of the Lord's coming is nearer. We worship God who promises us joy without end. **Penitential Rite**

Confident of the happiness that lies in the future, let us remember our sins and repent Lord Jesus, you came to gather the nations into the peace of God's kingdom

Lord have Mercy

Lord Jesus You come in word and sacrament to strengthen us in holiness

Christ have Mercy

Lord Jesus

You will come in glory with salvation for your people.

Lord have Mercy Praver

God of glory and compassion, at your touch the wilderness blossoms, broken lives are made whole, and fearful hearts grow strong in faith.

Open our eyes to your presence
and awaken our hearts to sing your praise. To all who long for your Son's return grant perseverance and patience, that we may announce in word and deed the good news of the kingdom.
We ask this through him whose coming is certain, whose day draws near: your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ,

who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever.

Introduction to the Scripture Readings Isaiah 35:1-6, 10 Isaiah looks forward to the

Day of Joy, when God's power will be seen on earth.

James 5:7-10 James reminds us to be patient, for the Lord's coming in glory will be soon.

Matthew 11:2-11 Today's Gospel tells us that what Isaiah prophesied came to pass in the life of Jesus.

Seeing Your Life Though The Lens Of The Gospel

• Even John the Baptist experienced doubt in prison we hear in the Gospel today. Jesus doesn't condemn him but offers evidence of the Messiah's work. Can I bring my own questions and disappointments to God with similar honesty, trusting that He can handle my doubt?

• Jesus points to His deeds – the blind see, the lame walk, and the good news is preached to the poor. God's kingdom is often revealed in acts of healing and liberation. Where do I see this healing and liberating work in my life and community? How can I be a part of it?

• Jesus warns his followers against being a 'reed shaken by the wind.' Following Christ requires conviction, not just fleeting enthusiasm. Is my faith and moral compass firm, or do they easily shift with cultural trends or personal challenges?

• Jesus calls John the greatest of prophets yet clarifies that the least in the kingdom is greater. True greatness in God's eyes is not about status but about humble closeness to and imitation of Christ. Does my pursuit of being great match with Jesus' definition – found in servanthood and intimacy with Him?

Advent calls us

To stop and think. But for nearly everyone the season of Advent is also the busiest time of the year. There is so much to be done to prepare for Christmas; cards, presents, the planning of meals, hospitality in general. Leaving aside whether we actually need to do all this and whether it could not all be simplified, the actuality of most lives during Advent is emphatically not one of contemplation. We can benefit from moments each day, that we set aside just to keep ourselves grounded in faith. It is Jesus and his birth that we celebrate, not just togetherness. Can we still enter into the spirit of Advent, this holy season?

RECONCILIATION (Confession)

God loves all of humanity. He delights in us. He never loses faith in us, even though we may lose faith in ourselves. He never ceases to love us, even though we may have turned our back on him and tried to reject him and his Church. God's mercy is endless, and it gives him joy to take away our sins.

When you celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation, we should think more of God and his mercy than of our sins. Your very wish to celebrate it, and the effort you make to do so, are signs that God's love is already enfolding you and his grace is at work in you. Facing your sins, and naming them, can be a painful experience. But there is joy and liberation in being reconciled, to God and the Church.

In your preparation, therefore, let the thought of God's love and compassion fill you and give you heart. No life is so ruined that God cannot build it up again; no heart so withered that he cannot refresh it and make it young again.

PREPARING FOR THE SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION

As you prepare to celebrate the Sacrament, begin not by thinking about your own life but about the life and words of Jesus. It is good to have a standard against which to measure your life and the kind of person you Jesus provides the standard for us Christians. He loved God and his neighbour with a love beyond all telling, and he showed it in so many ways - he was compasforgiving; he mixed with outcasts. He was a friend of sionate and sinners and the sick and the poor. He trusted God, his Father, totally.

It is his life and words that give meaning to our own. So before celebrating the sacrament, spend a little time thinking about Jesus, the kind of person he was, the attitudes and values he had, the way he treated others. Think of what Jesus has to say to us today, and to our world.

Having looked at Jesus' life, now take time to look at your own. Here is an examination of conscience which may help you to look more closely at the serious issues in your life and where you have failed in living as God would like us to live. It is a check list against which to measure how your life as a Christian is going.

What kind of Christian am I in:

My religious practice: Do I give time to God in prayer?

Do I pray regularly?
Do I join my parish community for Sunday Mass?

or Holydays of Obligation?

My home life:

What am I like to live with?

Do I make my home a happy place to live. Do I honour my marriage vows or my duties towards my parents or children, those whom I love?

Am I selfish or moody?

Do I cause serious problems in my home through abusing alcohol or drugs, being violent or bullying, being lazy or selfish?

of disrespectful to the aged in the home.

My relationship with others:

Am I tolerant of others?

Do I treat others with respect? Am I bitter towards anyone?

Do I hold a grudge against anyone? Do I forgive those who hurt me?

Do I look down on any group or individual because of class, race, nationality, politics, sex or religion?

My practice of justice:

Am I too fond of material things? Do I respect the needs, rights and property

of others?

Am I honest in my work and business relationships?

Do I pay my debts and return borrowed goods?

Do I cheat, steal, or make false claims? Do I support the Church Financially

Do I finically support my Parish and its

Clergy by paying: Parish Dues at Christmas, Autumn, Spring and Easter?

Do I respect the environment and all God's creation?

Remember that God isn't interested in how good a memory you have, or how many failings you discover in yourself. It is impossible to recall every fault and failing. God knows that. All God asks is that you come before him genuinely sorry for those times when you have failed him and failed the community.

When celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

(I) Begin by making the Sign of the Cross, saying aloud; "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit,

(2) Tell how long it is since you last went to confession, and any particular details about your life which may be helpful for the priest to know e.g. whether you are married or single, working or unemployed, going to school etc.

(3) Then, confess your sins. The Examination of Conscience (above) will help you to look at your life as a Christian and where and how you might have failed. The Priest gives you a suitable penance after which you;

(4) then express your sorrow by saying an act of contrition.

God has forgiven you. But your celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation does not end when you come out of the confessional or leave the church. At the heart of the celebration is your undertaking, not only that, with God's help, you will try not to sin again, but that you will show by the way you live that you are conscious of having been forgiven and reconciled with others, the Church and God.

SUGGESTED ACTS OF CONTRITION There are many act of contrition like those

listed below. You may have a favourite of your own and are welcome to say it.

- (A) O my God, I am sorry for all my sins because I have offended thee who are infinitely good, and I firmly resolve with the help of thy grace nevermore to sin again Amen.
- **(B)** O my God, I am sorry for all my sins because they displease you, who are so good and deserving of all my love. With your help I will not sin again. Amen
- (C) O my God, I thank you for loving me. I am sorry for all my sins, for not loving others and not loving you. Help me to live like Jesus and not to sin again. Amen.
- **(D)** O my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended you, who are all good and deserving of all my love. I firmly resolve with the help of your grace to sin no more. Amen.
