Feast of the Holy Family

None of us would ever dare to describe our families as 'holy'. We are aware of the imperfections we possess and (maybe more aware) of the faults of others in our families! Our family history is written in our hearts, and it is not all sweetness and light.

I believe that a holy person is someone who is aware of the gifts that God has given them and they do their best to live and share these gifts. Most importantly amid their families. So, while we would not describe our families as 'holy', we can agree that we have the potential to be 'holy families'.

Acceptance and patience in the heart of our families is fundamental. Respecting the uniqueness of each family member is a basic starting point. We are all different. Accepting every person for who they are rather than who we feel they should be, is crucial.

Forgiveness is also a cornerstone to holiness. We forgive family members not because they deserve it but precisely because they do not. If they deserved it, it would be called justice. God forgives us when we least deserve it, and we are called to do the same. Otherwise, past hurts and arguments stay at the surface of our lives, and we never move past them.

Gratitude is also foundational to holiness. Counting our blessings instead of our hurts and trials. Life wounds us all in so many ways but they are never the entire story. But if we become fixated on them, they could define us. And there is much more to us than that. We have been blessed in wonderful ways, but we need eyes to see the blessings and hearts to appreciate them.

These are gifts that we have within us and are called to share.

Seeing all the poverty that surrounded Mother Theresa, a cynic once said to her, "Mother, you don't seem to be very successful." She responded, "God did not call me to be successful, God called me to be faithful." So too, on this feast of The Holy Family we recall that God did not call us to be perfect, he called us to be holy – they are not the same.

May the Message of Christ...

On this Feast of the Holy Family we are invited to reflect on the importance of family in our lives and on the values which underpin and sustain it. Our identity as human beings is inseparable from that network of relationships we call 'family' – not just the family into which we are born, but the wider family of friends and relations, of Church, of all humanity with whom we are inextricably connected. And our final destiny is to belong to the family of the blessed in heaven.

It is impossible to listen to the readings today without thinking of the many parents in Gaza, Ukraine, Sudan and many other countries, whose hearts are pierced with unspeakable pain at what is happening to their children in our troubled and violent world. There is no easy answer to their pain, except to remember that it was this deeply wounded world that Christ was born into and came to save. And to remember, too, that life for the holy family was not all sunshine and roses. They were not spared the anguish and pain that many families are experiencing today. They had to undertake a perilous journey when Mary was heavily pregnant and she had to bring her precious baby to birth in an animal shelter. They had to endure the terror of an imminent threat to the life of their special child and flee into exile until the threat was ended. They were no strangers to hurt and puzzlement as their teenage Son asserted his independence, and to the pain of his rejection by the very people he came to save.

Christmas is a time for us to reconnect and bond with family and friends those with whom we feel most at home. Today, we live in a world of mass communication but perhaps we communicate less with those who matter most in our lives. Christmas is a time when we should make a special effort to reach out to those whose love creates a home for us. It is a time to let go of grudges and build bridges, a time, as St Paul reminds us in our second Reading, 'to let the message of Christ, in all its richness, find a home' in us, a time to be kind, compassionate and gentle; a time to forgive and to let the peace of Christ reign in our hearts.

God, our Father,
We are brothers and sisters in Jesus your Son,
One family, in the Spirit of your love.
Bless us with the joy of love.

Make us patient and kind, gentle and generous, welcoming to those in need. Help us to live your forgiveness and peace. Protect all families with your loving care,

Increase our faith, Strengthen our hope, Keep us safe in your love, Make us always grateful for the gift of life that we share.
