A NOTE FROM FR. JIM......

Recently I was reading a beautiful sermon by Monsignor Charles Pope, in which he reflects on his experience of visiting Bethlehem in the Holy Land. He begins by saying that the entire experience is marked by humility — it is humbling from start to finish. You arrive in Bethlehem, and the first thing you must do is step off the bus and submit to a search by soldiers holding assault rifles. They go through your belongings and examine you closely. It is uncomfortable and humiliating. Then you continue your journey to the place where Jesus was born. To reach it, you must climb a very steep hill. When you arrive, you are faced with a very low door — only about four or five feet high. Normally doors are six feet or more, but this one was deliberately built low to prevent horsemen from entering and desecrating the holy site. To pass through it, you must stoop down, bend over, and enter in a posture of humility. Inside, you join a queue and wait — sometimes for an hour or two. When your turn comes, you carefully descend a very steep staircase. It is narrow and dangerous; you must move slowly and attentively. Eventually, you reach the place itself: a small cave, a hole in the ground, where you are invited to ponder the mystery of where the God of the universe became human. God is teaching us what real humility is. A God who out of love for you and me stooped down from the highest heavens into a cave housing animals to show us the lengths He's willing to go to save us. How often do we find ourselves in queues, in airports, or in public places, muttering, "This is a disgrace," or "We deserve better than this," or complaining about poor service? How often do we struggle to be patient, to humble ourselves, to let others go before us? Bishop Barron always says that the greatest spiritual lesson we will ever learn is this: your life is not all about you. Because we are part of something much larger - God's great plan of creation and salvation. God is building realities far greater than any one of us, and the Church itself is part of that great plan. So this Christmas, as we ponder the Incarnation - theWord made flesh — let us ponder humility. Let us pray for the grace to be humble. As we begin a new year, may we realise that humility actually makes life easier. As the Latin phrase reminds us: Humilitas Veritas — humility is truth and the truth will set us free. Let's live in freedom and peace this new year.
