A NOTE FROM FR. JIM.....

Last weekend we had our first gathering of a men's group called Exodus 90. Around forty men—from different parts of Kerry, across Munster, and even beyond—we gather both physically and virtually to pray the rosary during the week and gather every Saturday morning to pray and to chat about the various ascetic challenges we've taken on for the 90 days. Exodus 90 helps us become aware of the addictions and bad habits in our lives, so that we can invite the light and grace of our Lord Jesus Christ into our lives. The goal is to become better men, better human beings. It is difficult, but it is also amazing what God can do when we open ourselves to Him. Part of our prayer Saturday morning is listening to a talk by Fr. John Riccardo called 'The Rescue Challenge', I would encourage everyone reading this to simply Google "The Rescue Challenge - Father John Riccardo" and follow it. It is really, really good. Fr. John believes that most 'Christian's have yet to hear the 'Gospel' proclaimed'. He simplifies it like this. We're Created - We were made by God out of love, for relationship with Him. Captured - Through sin, humanity fell under the power of the evil one; the world became broken. Rescued - Jesus Christ entered the world, suffered, died, and rose to free us. Sent - Having been rescued, we are now sent on mission to bring others back to God and help renew the world. During the week I heard a priest speaking about morality and how he believed that we are all innately good. That as human beings left to ourselves we will naturally choose good. I responded that I disagreed. I mentioned to him a book called Unimaginable by Jeremiah J. Johnston, which describes the world before Christianity—a dark world where it was survival of the fittest, women and children had no rights and were treated as possessions, slavery was widespread, the strong grew stronger, and the poor grew poorer. When Jesus entered the world and when the Church took root, through education, health services, art, literature, philosophy, the recognition that every human has been given a God given dignity. The world was transformed. Johnston also notes that as people in recent years move away from the Church and from God, there has been a return of darkness. He said the goodness in our current world comes from the 'Fumes' of two thousand years of Christianity. You may like the priest disagree with me but I genuinely believe this to be true. We are created good, but because of original sin, we do not always choose what is good. In today's Gospel Jesus beings His rescue mission. It's 'Dynamite' but we've grown too familiar with it. The world is crying out, it is suffering. We cannot save our world out of own goodness, we need God. May we rediscover the power of the Gospel and be rescued. Rescued people rescue.
