A NOTE FROM FR. JIM.....

Recently I read a reflection by Bishop Robert Barron on today's Gospel which really struck me. He points out that Jesus gives us very practical advice about something we all find difficult — what to do when someone hurts us, disappoints us or does something wrong. Jesus says: go and speak to the person directly. That sounds simple, but it can be very difficult. Often our first temptation is to tell someone else. We complain, we gossip, we look for people who will agree with us. Before long, a small disagreement can become a much bigger problem. Rumours begin, sides are taken, and relationships are damaged. Jesus offers us a different way. If someone has hurt you, speak to them privately and honestly. Give them the opportunity to explain, to listen and perhaps to put things right. As Bishop Barron reminds us, the purpose is never to embarrass or humiliate someone. Christian correction must always come from love. If that private conversation doesn't work, Jesus says to bring one or two others along — not to gang up on the person, but to help bring understanding and reconciliation. Only as a last resort should the matter involve the wider community. There is great wisdom in this Gospel. Jesus asks us to hold together two things that are not always easy to combine: truth and love. Love does not mean pretending that everything is fine when it isn't. But neither does truth give us permission to gossip, condemn or destroy another person's reputation. Perhaps there is a simple question we can carry with us this week: When I have a problem with someone, do I talk to them — or do I talk about them? Jesus asks us to have the courage to speak the truth, but always with kindness, respect and love.
